

AP Seminar Course Content

AP Seminar will be divided into roughly three parts. The first third of the year will be teaching students to learn and master reading and writing techniques, citation, analysis of various formats of sources and presentation skills. The second third of the year will be devoted to the team project and some of the individual research. The remaining third will be spent on the individual research and presentation as well as reviewing for the end-of-course exam.

Students will practice each of the performance tasks prior to beginning on the ones submitted to CollegeBoard for scoring.

Expectations

Students will conduct the bulk of their research and writing in class using school computers. At home, students are expected to have access to a computer with internet and cloud access in order to complete assignments and conduct further research. Student are expected to have consistent attendance particularly during the team component.

Summer Assignment

All student will be required to complete a summer writing assignment due at the start of class.

PREREQUISITES

Students are expected to have a strong independent word ethic as well as strong writing skills.

Assessment Overview

Scores are determined by 2 papers, 2 presentations and a written exam. There are severe consequences for plagiarism.

Performance Task 1-

1200 word paper, team presentation with defense questions

Performance Task 2-

2000 word paper, individual presentation with defense questions

Performance Task 3-

2 hour exam based upon 4 sources
