CELEBRATING LITERACY WEEK AT TEQUESTA



FLYING & DIVING FOR VOLLEYBALL





Black History Week was recognized for 50 years until president Gerald Ford signed a bill stating that it would become a month. It was named Black History Month, and it happens every February, and it focuses on the contributions that African Americans went through to achieve equality, and important African Americans who helped to change our world for the better.

Black History Month is not only about African Americans who made contributions to the abolition of slavery, it is also about African Americans who made scientific discoveries, such as Dr. Shirley Ann Jackson. She was the first Black woman to acquire a doctorate in physics at MIT. Her work in helping to develop faster communication technology earned her 3 awards including a W.E.B. DuBois medal from Harvard, and a National Medal of science from Harvard. Another African American scientist is Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett who helped developed the vaccine for COVID-19. As a result, she received the NAACP Key of Life award in 2020. Other African-Americans who made significant contributions include Max Robinson, who became the first African-American anchor the nightly network news, and the first Black anchor in Washington D.C. He was also an activist against racism, and he was one of the founders of the National Association of Black Journalists (NABJ).

We asked some of our teachers about why they think Black History Month is important and how they try to help students learn about Black History Month and the achievements of African-Americans. Mr. Hankerson says, "Black History Month is important to me because it is an opportunity to highlight several people who have not been recognized for various accomplishments and contributions that they have made to our country.

To promote Black History Month in my class, students are researching different individuals or different periods of time that are significant for African Americans, and we also analyze how those times impact us today." Ms. Watson says, "For me, the most important part about Black History Month is educating students and celebrating the resiliency of historic African-American people and their contributions."
