





## Sun Activities

### SUN SAFETY ACTIVITIES FOR KIDS



Take a walk through your neighborhood and have your child point out the different examples of places to seek shade, such as umbrellas, porches, under a tree or a shade structure.



Select a sampling of 3 shirts from your child's closet. Hold each shirt up to a light so the child can see how much light shines through (e.g., dark colored shirts vs. light colored shirts, thin vs. thick fabric, etc.) Ask your child to pick the shirt they think provides the best sun protection. It's important to note that darker-colored shirts and heavier fabrics will provide better sun protection and are an important way to be safe in the sun. This also includes wearing sunscreen and seeking shade.



Take your child to the zoo to look at different types of animal skin, such as the smooth skin of dolphins, the dense fur of the polar bears, or a flamingo's feathers. Talk about how their skin protects them from the sun.



Place a dark, colored piece of construction paper on a sunny window sill with a solid object placed in the middle of it. Leave the object there for a few days. Have your child look weekly at the construction paper. Bring the object to see how much of the paper exposed to the sun is fading. Explain to your child that just as the sun has changed the unprotected portion of the paper, the sun does the same thing to their skin — changing and damaging it.



Note the sun's power by slicing one apple into rings and hanging the rings from individual strings to dry. Place another apple in a cool, dry spot. Make sure the hanging apple rings do not touch, and cover them with cheesecloth to discourage bugs. Have children observe the rings' changes. To demonstrate more clearly the difference between dry one and the dry the apple rings are dried out, cut the other apple (the one you put aside at the beginning of the experiment) into rings. Then compare a freshly cut ring to a dried one. Explain that the sun has the same power to dry out your skin as it has to dry apple slices. This can be a reminder to moisturize your skin after being in the sun.



Purchase UV-changing beads from a craft supply store. These can be made into bracelets or backpack zipper pulls. The beads are a useful and fun way to demonstrate the effects of UV rays on the skin.



## SUN SAFETY ACTIVITIES FOR KIDS



Decorate hats that will provide sun protection with fabric paint, pom-poms, pom-poms and other items to encourage your child to wear the hat in the sun.



If your child is in Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Campfire or Indian Guides? Help him or her start a service project to educate kids in the community about sun safety, and the importance of wearing sunscreen and covering up.



The best way to teach your child about sun protection is to start early and incorporate it into their everyday routine – make sun safety a habit! Keep sun safety items near the front door, in the car, and in your child's backpack. I'm sure by now your child doesn't complain about wearing his or her seatbelt or a helmet while riding a bike, so the same can happen for sun protection habits.

## Monitor Homework

Let your child know that you think education is important and so homework has to be done. Here are some ways to help your child with homework:

Have a special place for your child to study. The homework area doesn't have to be fancy. A desk in the bedroom is nice, but for many children, the kitchen table or a corner of the living room works just fine. The area should have good lighting and it should be fairly quiet. Provide supplies and identify resources. For starters, have available pencils, pens, erasers, writing paper and a dictionary. Other supplies that might be helpful include a stapler, paper clips, maps, a calculator, a pencil sharpener, tape, glue, paste, scissors, a ruler, a calculator, index cards, a thesaurus and an almanac. If possible, keep these items together in one place. If you can't provide your child with needed supplies, check with her teacher, school counselor or principal about possible sources of assistance.


Set a regular time for homework. Having a regular time to do homework helps children to finish assignments. Of course, a good schedule depends in part on your child's age, as well as her specific needs. You'll need to work with a young child to develop a schedule. You should give your older child the responsibility for making up a schedule independently—although you'll want to make sure that it's a workable one. You may find it helpful to have her write out her schedule and put it in a place where you'll see it often, such as on the refrigerator.

Remove distractions. Turn off the TV and discourage your child from making and receiving social telephone calls during homework time. (A call to a classmate about an assignment, however, may be helpful.) If you live in a small or noisy household, try having all family members take part in a quiet activity during homework time. You may need to take a noisy toddler outside or into another room to play. If distractions can't be avoided, your child may want to complete assignments in the local library.

Don't expect or demand perfection. When your child asks you to look at what she's done—from skating a figure 8 to finishing a math assignment—show interest and praise her when she's done something well. If you have criticisms or suggestions, make them in a helpful way. One final note: You may be reluctant to help your child with homework because you feel that you don't know the subject well enough or because you don't speak or read English as well as your child. But helping with homework doesn't mean doing the homework. It isn't about solving the problems for your child, it's about supporting him to do his best. You may not know enough about a subject such as calculus to help your child with a specific assignment, but you can help nonetheless by showing that you are interested, helping him get organized, providing a place the materials he needs to work, monitoring his work to see that he completes it and praising his efforts.



#### **Tips for Studying Science and being Successful!**

- Do the assigned science reading before class discussion.
- Read for understanding and ask questions.
- Scrutinize each paragraph and pay close attention to vocabulary.
- Read each chapter and your notes more than once.
- Don't skip sample problems and examples those are very important.
- Read all the text features such as graphs, charts, and text boxes.
- Check your work by collaborating with a classmate. Share what you found during the experiment.
- Redo experiments at home with your family. Share with them what is happening in your classroom and the science world around us.

## ***Fun at Home with Math Fluency***

### Measuring

Break out the rulers and measuring tape! The beauty of using measurement to appeal to the language of numbers for your child simply comes down to purpose—if something must fit, numbers come to the rescue.

### Counting

Have your child help you with taking inventory of the fridge. If you have any kind of garden or fruit bearing tree, have them count your bounty! Use your view from the window and take count of all the birds you see, cars that drive by, dogs on a walk, etc. You can even have your child keep a counting journal of all the things they're keeping track of each day. If they're a sports fan, encourage them to follow player and team statistics and scores.

### Estimating

Even adults have fun with this type of guessing game. Put a jar of something out on your counter each week for the whole family to guess the number of items they think the jar contains. After a week or so, take them out and count them (more counting practice!), and have prize for the person who is the closest.

### Baking/Cooking

Break out the cookbooks! Aside from the fact that we all need to eat, there is a great deal of fun to be had in the kitchen. Considering liquid volumes and weight measurements in recipes add a new dimension to measurement and immediate purpose to the use of numbers.

### Earning

Finally, if measuring and baking don't do the trick, an allowance can certainly pique the interest of any child with their eyes on prize. Help your child develop number sense along with responsibility as they maintain some kind of "account" or piggybank.

Hello amazing Kindergarten families, happy holiday season. We are so thankful for all the support you have given us so far this year. In December we have a ton of fun activities planned.

Math: we will be focus on subtraction within 10.

Reading: We will focus on identifying characters, setting and major events in stories. We will be answering the question, Why do we us technology? We will continue practicing decoding (tapping out) and encoding (writing) CVC (consonant-vowel-consonant) words. We will continue practicing our primer sight words adding three additional words each week. Please continue to practice these nightly, and have students look for their sight words in books.

Science: We continue to learn about patterns of movement. Students will understand How can we explore the different ways and the different patterns by which objects move? What is the difference between a push and a pull?

Social Studies: Our focus shifts to learning about American History and comparing our lives to those in the past.

We are also preparing for our Winter Show on December 17th so please help your children practice their songs. We cannot wait to see what amazing work our Kindergarteners complete this month.

## *First Grade*



Winter in Florida is finally here! Cooler weather and warmer clothes as the holidays are right around the corner. That's right-our first graders will be able to participate and will be immersed in many enjoyable holiday activities at school. First grade is excited to learn about the importance of holidays and how they are culturally celebrated around the world.

**Reading/Writing:** Students will be able to explain the similarities and differences between information provided in visuals and words within an informational text. They will be comparing and contrasting two texts on the same topics.

**Math:** Students will practice their math strategies using addition and subtraction. They will be counting by ones and tens to 120, using a number chart. (Skip counting by 2's to 20 and by 5's to 100.

**Science:** Our marvelous scientists will be learning about magnifiers and how they are helpful to others.

**Social Studies:** Students will learn about patriotic symbols, holidays, and observances. They will compare life then (in the past) with life now (the present) as they learn about different holidays celebrated around the world.

## Second Grade



Happy Holidays! Our scholars are making gains everyday.

**Reading:** Our scholars will identify Characters' Perspective. Questions you could ask your child after reading a literary text are: Who is telling the story?, Where in the story does another character tell what he thinks or what he or she feels about what is happening in the story? Our scholars will also, identify and explain similes, idioms, and alliteration in texts.

**Science:** Our Scientists demonstrate that the greater the force (push or pull) applied to an object, the greater the change in motion of the object. This month's key concepts will be: Pushing and pulling can cause an object to change position and to move. People, objects, or nature can push or pull objects. The more force applied to an object, the greater the change in motion of the object.

**Math:** Our mathematicians will solve one- and two-step addition and subtraction real-world problems. Instruction will include understanding the context of the problem, as well as the quantities within the problem. *Together we will work on* problems that include creating real-world situations based on an equation.

## Third Grade



Our third graders are busy learning and growing every day! In Reading, our focus is on the 3rd Grade Benchmark Education Unit 4- Comparing Point of View. Students will continue learning about standards that were previously taught along with learning new standards within the Unit. It is critical that students are present at school every day so, they won't have to catch up

on assignments and standards they were taught while they were absent. Please continue having your child read for 20-30 minutes each night with a book to build fluency and comprehension skills.

**Math:** Students will continue to work on strategies to use when multiplying and dividing through word problems and equations and Geometry. Practicing multiplication facts every night plays a vital part in solving equations and increasing multiplication fluency. Third graders are also responsible for returning their homework assignments, to show their understanding of the skills previously taught.

On December 2, third graders will be attending their first field trip to the Broward Center of the Performing Arts to watch an educational musical and in January we will be visiting the Anne Kolb Nature Center.

## *Fourth Grade*



**Math:** We are entering the half point of the EnVision curriculum! Can you believe it? Therefore, we are gearing up to take the Cumulative Assessment for all seven topic lessons soon... Let's take a **RECAP of the Math Topics** we've learned so far: Place Value: Numbers to One Million, Multiplication and Division Basic Facts, Multiply by 1-Digit Numbers, Multiply Greater Numbers, Divide by 1-Digit Numbers, Use Operations with Whole Numbers to Solve Problems, and Number Patterns, Factors, and Divisibility What can you all do to ensure our students are prepared?

1) Review all the Math Topic Family Engagement letters sent home for chapters 1 through 7 with our student

2) Use assigned online resources such as I-Ready Math, Success Maker, Savvas Bridge for videos and lesson practice, Fluency Flight, and much more... Please remember: The more our student

practices math skills and strategies in school and at home, the better he/she will get throughout the school year!

**Reading:** This month, our 4th grade students will dive deeper into analyzing texts to identify the narrator's point of view and understand characters' perspectives. They will explore how characters influence the development of a story and learn to identify the plot and theme. Additionally, students will practice summarizing fiction and analyzing poetry, focusing on rhyme and structure. We are continuing to build skills to nurture inquisitive and thoughtful readers.

**Language arts/science:** Students will be creating a new fictional scene and continue working on their cursive writing skills. They will be learning how to form and use verb tenses and review prepositional phrases. Diving into science students will be experimenting with forces and learning all about earth's movements.

**Social Studies:** Our Social Studies standards will focus on the early exploration and the first colonial settlements in Florida. Topics include the motivations of the early Spanish explorers of Florida and the importance of the first permanent settlements in Florida, particularly the City of St. Augustine. Topics such as daily life in Florida missions and the effects of colonization on Native populations will also be discussed.

## *Fifth Grade*



Fifth Grade continues to push forward. We are collecting \$17 for the upcoming field trip to the Frost Museum. We are taking a trip to Driftwood Middle school and the City of Miramar's Aviation Expo. These field trips should cement some of the lessons the students have learned this year. In Math, students will be mastering skills of division with decimals. Finally, in ELA, students will continue to build their comprehension by mastering the skill of sequencing in a variety of different genres.
