This month in mathematics we will be focusing on increasing student collaboration within the math block! We are working as a staff to purposefully plan for opportunities where students are exploring mathematical thinking and reasoning through vocabulary building, partner work, math performance tasks, and interactive ways of checking for understanding throughout each lesson. We want math to be hands-on and fun!

Students completed their midyear iReady diagnostic assessment, and we have used this recent data to ensure we are focusing our instruction to meet individual needs through daily small group instruction in the classroom. Teachers have completed their data analysis to know individual student growth and progress. Feel free to reach out to your student's teacher to see how and what you can do to partner with us in order to provide your student with the best opportunity for math achievement! We need and appreciate a strong parent partnership!

There are lots of neat opportunities to help support our mathematics instructional focus at home, too! As students begin to learn about measurement and geometric reasoning in class, families can support student learning in fun ways right at home whether it's taking a walk around the neighborhood to look for shapes in building structures and nature, measuring and weighing items around the house, cooking a recipe with measuring cups and spoons, or designing a shoebox diorama, creating a garden bed, or rearranging furniture to freshen up the look of a family room or bedroom all while taking measurements to ensure a proper fit! I encourage you to have fun, be creative, and put classroom math skills to practical use in the real world!

## LITERACY NOOK WHTE MICHELEROTEACKER



> This month we welcome Spring on March $19^{\text {th }}$. We will also be engaging in some rest and relaxation during our Spring Break! Take some time to enjoy some good books with your kids.

This month, students will be working on Unit 7 of Benchmark Advance which focuses on history, culture and geography. Students will explore how the past affects the present and future. They will be focusing on the author's purpose, explore how text features contribute to the meaning of the text, and, as always, we will use text evidence to support claims.

Please encourage your child to complete an iReady lesson at home at least once per week.

Below are a few suggested topics for you to discuss with your child as they coincide with this unit's focus. Oral language helps to build background knowledge and allows you to discuss unfamiliar vocabulary words with them.

- Holidays: Which do you celebrate? How do you celebrate? Why do you celebrate this holiday?
- Compare events and things that have changed over time: How have you or your classroom changed since the beginning of the school year? How is school changed since you entered kindergarten?
- Historical Figures: Discuss a historical figure that is important to you. Some examples are Helen Keller, Alexander Graham Bell and Harriet Tubman. You can also discuss your own ancestors.
- Community: What type of community do we live in? What is it known for? What makes it special?
- Evolving Communities: Why and how do communities evolve? Discuss transportation, weather, and look at maps together.

## FIRST GRADE

Spring is almost here!
This month in Reading, students will read and compare selections about United States history and its preservation to understand why it is important to remember the past. Students will grow their knowledge of the past to understand the present and plan for the future. We will also be studying tools that people use, such as timelines and maps to help organize and understand events of the past.
In Math, we are working on ordering objects by length. Students will compare and order the length of up to three objects using direct and indirect comparisons. Students will also be measuring with a ruler. We will be estimating the length of an object to the nearest inch. We will also be measuring the length of an object to the nearest inch or centimeter. Please make sure your child utilizes iReady at home. Remember your child needs at least two lessons per subject and 45 minutes per week.

## SECOND GRADE

Spring has arrived and students are growing their learning! The 2nd grade students will be reviewing the Central Idea and Details in an informational text. Students need to read an informational text and find the central idea based on details, text features, and vocabulary. Students will need to retell in their own words using an informational text using the central idea and details. Reading daily will help students read more fluently and write about the text to enhance comprehension. In Math, students will be adding and subtracting within 1,000 . Students will be using models and drawings to show regrouping in the tens and hundreds place value. Practicing daily with adding and subtracting within 1,000 can help students with fluency. Thank you for your continued support!


## THIRD GRADE

Greetings, from the Third Grade Team, We are currently working on Unit 7, in ELA, Communities Then and Now. Our Essential Question is: What is a community? We are working on Topic 11 in Math, Fraction Equivalence, and Comparison. The focus is to use models to compare fractions that refer to the same whole and have the same denominator or numerator. In Science, we are learning about Friction. Where can we find friction in our everyday lives? Our current Social Studies focus for March is Women's History Month.
This month, we are having an in-house stemobile field trip with the Museum of Discovery and Science.
Parents, please have students work on iReady Reading and Math at home to complete the lessons required for the next PAW Party on March 20th. Students must have the required lessons completed by March 13th. Please make sure your child has headphones for the computer. Headphones are mandatory to complete the required lessons on the computer.
Your partnership is vital to your child's success. Supporting our students with homework, reading 20 minutes every day, learning multiplication facts, and doing iReady Reading and Math, at least, three times per week, will assist them in becoming proficient learners. Please check and clean out the Green Folders daily. Review lessons and assignments with your child to support them in areas where they may be struggling. Thanks for partnering with us.

## FOUTH GRADE

## FOURTH GRADE

Hello Fourth Grade Families! In Reading, our next unit of study is "Transcontinental Railroad." We are kicking off our seventh unit in the Benchmark Advance program. In our seventh unit, we will read and compare selections about the construction and impact of the transcontinental railroad to understand how communities evolve. We will be reading a variety of genres, including informational texts, a firsthand account, a diary entry, and even song lyrics! This unit will allow you and your child to discuss the history of the United States while examining how a country can change over time.
In Math, Topic 11 focuses on developing an understanding of decimals and decimal notation by connecting fractions and decimals. Your child will work with and compare decimals through the hundredth place (0.00). They will understand how equivalent fractions will be used to add a fraction with a denominator of 10 and a fraction with a denominator of 100.
In Science, we will learn about the Forces of Motion \& Seasonal Changes of Florida's Organisms.

## FOURTH GRADE continued

In Social Studies, students will learn how technological advancements and human settlement impact Florida's growth.
For the PAW Party, students must have passed nine reading and nine math lessons at 67\% or higher from February 12- March 13. Students can log in at home to work on lessons. Students will get a prize ticket if they receive $70 \%$ or higher on the Unit 6 Assessment or Topic 1-11 Cumulative test.
Homework: Students receive Reading, Math, and Spelling homework each week. Please check their homework and review the concepts with them at home.

Students enrolling in Kindergarten must be age 5 or older on or before September 1st. Students attending a Broward County Public
School for the first time will need to bring the following to his/her assigned school when registering:

- Two documents showing proof of residence
- A Certificate of Immunization (HRS Form 680) which is available from a private physician or the Broward Health Department
- Proof of medical examination during the last 12 months
- Kindergarten and First Grade students must also present a birth certificate to show proof of age.
- A copy of the last report card, if applicable
